Horizontal Principles of Sustainability Governance

We have identified four interconnected horizontal principles based on our expertise and theory research:

Directionality

Defining clear long-term priorities and potential risks to guide current decision making and provide collective understanding of what is trying to be achieved.

Experimentalism

Embedding a 'learning through doing' approach based on the capacity to change approach when harmful path dependencies, new knowledge, or a lack of knowledge are found. Through this, we learn what does and doesn't work.

Collaboration

Recognising and orchestrating actions based on the need to involve multiple actors, and understanding of their agencies, capacities, and synergies.

Sincerity

Building legitimacy and trust by corresponding actions to goals, and being honest if they don't yet correspond.


